








### **TOK EXHIBITION**





















### **SKI CLUB 2021-2022**

### **ANNOTATED POETRY BECOMES WALL ART**

The G10 Literature in English class has been hard at work analyzing poetry...and turning it into art. Annotation is a way for literature scholars to break down the language in a text to understand how writers achieve effects and convey moods, tones and hidden meanings. Four groups of G10 students studied and annotated a different famous poem: a eulogy by William Wordsworth, a cutting criticism of urban development by Boey Kim Cheng, a parody on romance by Carol Ann Duffy and a sonnet about broken hearts by Edna St. Vincent Millay.





The students then transposed their annotations onto the walls of A2 as a beautiful reminder of how to study and appreciate poetry in preparation for the IGCSE Literature in English examinations. Each group gave a presentation on their poem. Not only did they do some impressive analysis and interpretive thinking, but they also proved their artistic talents and created a dynamic learning environment for all students who use A2!
